

The Littlest Mermaid

A typical day for a newborn baby revolves around the basics - eating, pooping and sleeping. Sounds simple, right? For twomonth-old Winnie things became complicated when her mom Holly made the surprising discovery that her precious infant was not pooping correctly. She noticed there was not an opening at her anus and a visit to their pediatrician confirmed the diagnosis of an imperforate anus.

This rare congenital defect meant Winnie could not have normal bowel movements. Her body had developed an alternative opening (a fistula) for her to poop. Winnie was referred to Lucile Packard Children's Hospital at Stanford where doctors performed immediate surgery to repair the malformation. The doctors created a temporary colostomy for her bowel movements while her newly opened anus healed. After a stressful hospital stay Winnie was finally able to return home to her family – where her adoring 2 1/2 and 5-year-old sisters, dad and grandpa were waiting to shower her with love. Her parents were grateful to be greeted by Coastal Kids nurse Kim, who supported Holly in caring for her delicate daughter and helped troubleshoot challenges for the precarious ten weeks of healing.

Under Kim's watchful eye, Holly took excellent care of Winnie. In April she was readmitted to Stanford for surgery to connect her colon to her newly opened anus and close the colostomy. This hospitalization was much easier, and Winnie once again returned home to her playful sisters and loving family. However, it was a bittersweet moment when Winnie no longer needed the extra care of nurse. On Kim's last visit, five-year-old Eleanor said, "Nurse Kim are you gonna come back and play with us soon?" With Winnie on her way to a full recovery, Coastal Kids was ready to step back and let her family get back to a typical routine. Kim did promise Holly that she would stay in touch to follow the adventures of the littlest mermaid in the family.

Letter from the Executive Director

When the Coastal Kids journey began thirteen years ago, I could not have imagined how many challenges we would face on the path to caring for children at home. I believed then, as I still do today, that children deserve the same high-quality healthcare options as adults. Coastal Kids is the only agency offering in-home medical care in the

Central Coast and South Bay, and the only provider of palliative and end-of-life care for children in these communities. Although this work is our most difficult, we are grateful to give families with terminal children the choice to care for their child at home - where they want to be.

Our team of nurses, therapists and social workers offers calm in a sea of uncertainty for more than 600 families each year. Most of our Coastal Kids return to health and race off into their teen and adult years without looking back at those bumpy weeks and months when we knew them. A few, however, receive a terminal diagnosis and come home to spend their last precious moments with their family. It is these special kids who leave the deepest footprints on our hearts. In 2017, we cared for twelve children at the end of life, and helped their families pick up the pieces after their death.

It is thanks to, you, our community of supporters that we can continue to care for these special kids. This spring, we are thrilled to once again share with you their stories and to introduce you to our pioneering palliative care team.

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From Mountain View to King City and Ben Lomond to Hollister

Coastal Kids staff drive more than 150,000 miles each year on coastal highways, country roads and city streets to the homes of kids living with illness and injury. Nurses and therapists share medical expertise, developmental knowledge and peace of mind for the whole family. In 2017, our staff made 4,168 home visits with 617 children and their families. Our compassionate team cared for 9 children through the end of their lives and provided care and support for 20 bereaved families.

Wave of the Juture



Bumps and scrapes are a normal part of childhood. For most kids, a tumble off a bike or a tough kick in a soccer game mean only a temporary bruise or a cut that heals quickly. However, for Christian Perez, these everyday mishaps can have serious consequences. Christian has hemophilia, a genetic disease that prevents his blood from clotting. As a result, simple injuries can result in significant blood loss or dangerous internal bleeding.

For an active eleven-year-old who loves sports, having hemophilia means he often misses out on playing soccer with his friends. Fortunately for him, he is able to receive Factor VIII transfusions, they replace the missing protein in his blood and make day to day activities safer. Since 2005, Coastal Kids Home Care nurse Kim has been checking in on him monthly first to flush his port to ensure safe transfusions and later to work with his mom and him on learning how to do external transfusions so that his port could be removed.

Today, Christian is nearly independent of Coastal Kids. He receives transfusions 3-4 times each week from his mom and is even learning to do them on his own. Next up? With the help of Kim, Christian is hoping to help teach his nine-year-old brother Jeremiah to manage his hemophilia too. Soon both Perez boys will be playing fewer video games and more soccer - without the fear of those minor bumps and bruises.

"Empowering kids like Christian and Jeremiah to take responsibility for their own care makes a huge difference in their confidence and their ability to just be kids." Ryan Miller is a playful, positive, and outgoing 7-year-old boy. He is also a cancer survivor. After being diagnosed with Burkitt's Lymphoma, getting to meet his favorite player Russell Wilson, and beating cancer, a lot has changed. But what happens after cancer?

When Coastal Kids' Clinical Social Worker, Ruth Emerson met Ryan for the first time he was just finishing up chemotherapy. His mom sought out Ruth to help Ryan adjust -- to school, to home, and to being a 5-year-old kid again. During treatment for cancer, Ryan had missed school and was struggling with asking for help. He was also having difficulty sharing attention with his older brother, Scott. At mom's request, Ruth also stepped in to help Scott cope with the ups and downs of being a sibling of a child with serious-illness.

During one-on-one counseling sessions, which often took place over backyard basketball games, Ruth gave Ryan the necessary tools to communicate at home and school. With the help of some extra tutoring, Ryan was soon back on track in his schoolwork and despite the occasional brotherly battle, he was getting along better with Scott too. In turn, Scott was learning to step out of the shadow of his demanding little brother. In the two years that Ruth has been seeing Ryan and Scott she's seen amazing progress in both.

"It was a wonderful time for me to be counseling the boys because it felt like Ryan's life was beginning again."

Pediatric Palliative Care: An Anchor in the Storm

When an infant is born with a complex congenital condition, or a child receives an unexpected diagnosis of cancer or other serious-illness, the whole family is thrust into stormy waters. Parents often feel powerless, unable to understand what their child's future – and their own – may hold. Access to home based palliative care services can provide the anchor that a child, and their whole family needs, to weather the storm ahead.

What is pediatric palliative care?

Pediatric palliative care is specialized medical care for children living with acute serious-illness and those with life-limiting diagnoses. Palliative care can be offered alongside curative treatment and provides an extra layer of support to families. The overall goal is to improve the quality of life of the child and their family through a holistic, multidisciplinary approach.


Palliative Care helps to manage the physical pain and symptoms resulting from a disease while also supporting the emotional and wellbeing of the child and their family. It also assists families to better understand their disease and treatment options and facilitates communications with doctors and other care providers. Pediatric palliative care helps patients and their caregivers to cope with the everyday challenges of living with a serious-illness. Palliative care can begin at any stage of a child's illness and when necessary can continue through the end-of-life.

Coastal Kids: Pioneers in Home Based Pediatric Palliative Care

Since 2005, Coastal Kids has provided in-home nursing and comfort care to children living with serious-illness and in 2010 were selected as a pilot provider of the California Children's Service Partners for Children Palliative Care Waiver Program. We have brought together a team of talented, dedicated and compassionate pediatric clinicians with extensive experience caring for children and families coping with serious-illness. During that time, we have provided dozens of families with comprehensive pediatric palliative care services – all in the comfort of home.

If curative treatment is no longer possible for a child, our palliative care team can continue to respond to the needs of a child and their family without interruption. Decades of experience caring for children at the end-of-life have taught us that children and their parents prefer to remain with their familiar team. Coastal Kids offers compassionate in-home care for children at the end-of-life and ongoing emotional support for their families.

Coastal Kids comprehensive approach emphasizes patient and family preferences and our team coordinates with physicians and nurse practitioners from pediatric specialty hospitals to ensure continuity of care from hospital to home. Once a child is home, our care coordinators regularly assess and manage the physical and emotional comfort of the child and ensure the family is supported throughout the course of their child's illness. Our core team includes:

- Pediatric Nurses who are expert in pain and symptom management for children. Nurses are available 24/7 to respond to caregivers' questions or concerns.
- Licensed Counselors who can answer questions from the child, siblings and parents and support the family in talking about what is happening. All family members also have access to one-on-one counseling.

Caring for Abigail

Abigail Marquez was born at a wee 1lb 100z and her early months in the neo-natal intensive care unit at UCSF were complicated by challenges with breathing and eating. Doctors placed a g-tube to support nutrition and weight gain and a tracheostomy to protect her fragile airway.

She arrived home at age seven months to the room she shares with her mom, Nora, and two brothers in a small Watsonville apartment – and the reassuring help of Coastal Kids nurse Robin. Together Nora and Robin have navigated Abigail's complex care. And recently, she was admitted to Coastal Kids palliative care program, to offer Abby and her mom additional support through care coordination, social work support and massage therapy.

Already, Abby has begun receiving regular massages resulting in big smiles. Her mom, Nora, is thankful for the lifeline that Coastal Kids has offered. Recently, Abby celebrated her second birthday complete with new hair bows courtesy of her favorite nurse.



Memories of Evelyn

Easter is a special time of year when little boys and girls get dressed in their best clothes and hunt backyards, parks and nearly everywhere for colorful Easter eggs. For the Hernandez-Acosta family, Easter 2017 will forever hold a very special place in their memory. Their cherished daughter Evelyn had been diagnosed with a terminal brain tumor just a few months before, and they knew it would be her last.

Despite the pain and discomfort of being sick, Evelyn was bubbling over with joy Easter morning. She excitedly searched for the treat-filled eggs, taking time to help her younger brother to fill his basket too. This scene exemplified Evelyn's special little spirit. As the only girl, with five rough and tumble brothers, she was doted upon by everyone. Yet she never acted spoiled, instead seeking to return the generous love two-fold.

Her diagnosis in early 2017 with DIPG, a rare terminal brain tumor, shook the foundation of her family. With a prognosis of only a few months to live, her mom Maribelle was thankful for the option to bring her baby home where Evelyn could be surrounded by the love of family. Coastal Kids Home Care Palliative Care team made this possible. Nurse Kim helped her parents monitor her pain and symptoms and clinical social worker Ruth assisted them with end-of-life planning and offered anticipatory grief counseling.



Just three months from diagnosis and after less than one month at home, Evelyn peacefully passed away in April 2017. One year later her family still feels the loss of their precious baby deeply. Ruth sees Maribelle twice monthly for bereavement counseling. During these sessions she also offers insights on how to help the boys cope with their sister's loss. Recently, Maribelle expressed that Coastal Kids helped her to feel less alone, and that she is beginning to feel hopeful for the future again.

Working Together for Grieving Kids

This past November, for Children's Grief Awareness Month, Coastal Kids Home Care partnered with the National Alliance for Grieving Children to host a local webcast of their conference on Working with Children Anticipating Death. The event was moderated by our Director of Bereavement, Ruth Emerson, LCSW and brought together nurses, social workers, chaplains and other individuals working with children in our community around these complex issues. Attendees gained valuable insights into developmentally appropriate ways to talk to children about death and dying.
